Our OHG Board spent time over the last year reexamining the origin and purpose of our organization. This helped us refocus our future work on historical preservation. As announced in our last newsletter, we therefore used our OHG Mission Statement to place further definition to our preservation work. Using the categories listed, we identified six properties in Sandusky that are deserving of recognition in the 2025 Preservation Awards program. Please understand that each selection can have features that fit into more than one category. And not all categories will be represented each awards year. You can help us to identify future examples of preservation work in the community. We try to keep track of these, but can miss some, so please give us a heads up if you notice one of them!

We are pleased to announce the following awards for 2025:

**532 Wayne Street – Nolan & Alexa Murray
Preservation Award**



Nolan and Alexa gave the exterior of their home the TLC that was needed. This included foundation work and replacement of pillars to the Colonial-Revival porch, window restoration, and fresh paint that accents the historical cast iron features of the Italianate façade. The house was built in 1868 by George March, a prominent dry goods dealer.

**519 Wayne Street – Christopher & Shawnasy Lucas
Restoration Award**



One of the exciting things to see is when a property owner turns back time and restores a home to original historical features. The Lucas's had the second coat of modern siding removed and the original restored to excellent condition. The 1889 Victorian built by Abram Lebensburger features trim, pillars, and ballister, representing Eastlake and Queen Anne styles. Along with his father and brothers, the Lebensburgers operated a men's clothing store at the southeast corner of Columbus Avenue and East Market Street.

**209 Fulton Street – Christopher & Susan Oppelt
Adaptive Reuse Award**



It's fun to see a building of former use turned into something else that preserves utility. This is the case of the West Market School, built in 1844. It is the only survivor to Sandusky's early commitment to public education. Two other grade schools and a high school were built in the same time period. It was used for approximately 60 years. Thanks to the work of the Oppelt's, the building is now an attractive single family dwelling.

**403 East Adams Street – Chris & Roberta Wiedle
The Rush Sloane House
Preservation Award**



Many of us had the pleasure of touring and viewing the incredible interior restoration work that was completed by the Wiedle's. Their preservation of the property is jointly owned. They generously pay homage to the late Ruth Parker who rescued the structure and began the work before her passing.

**149 East Water Street – Family Health Services
David Tatro, CEO
The Granary
Adaptive Reuse Award**



Built in 1868, The William Robertson Wholesale Grocery later became a granary operated as an outlet for Gallagher's Mill in Venice, Ohio. It remained a granary from 1911-1950. The High Victorian style includes bracketed eaves and arched braiding over the upper windows. The indented space in between floors holds the sign board. The original iron posts remain at the street level. Family Health spent \$4.1 million adding two additional floors and completing exterior work that preserves the integrity of the original structure.

The Carnegie Library
Preservation Award



Built in 1901, the structure was funded by Andrew Carnegie's contribution of \$50,000. Designed by Albert D'Oench and Joseph W. Yost, the Second Romanesque-Revival structure has twin turrets with battlements. Stone panels with carved books decorate the façade between the main windows. The portico with massive pillars leads to a main door. The recent work allows us to see what the building looked like when built. The work resulted in close attention to authentication with the use of building materials closely associated to the original structure. It also included restoration to the old Erie County Jail of 1883 that became part of the 1996 expansion and the new 2004 addition. In addition, work was also scheduled for the historic Follett House on Wayne Street. This work could also fall into the restoration category but the main emphasis was preservation.

Cooke-Dorn House

The Cooke-Dorn House sits quietly on Columbus Avenue. With the Old House Guild ending their stewardship of the facility on June 30th, no further tours of the home or property are being conducted. The Guild is in the process of transferring all responsibilities back to the Ohio History Connection in Columbus, the State agency that owns the site.

In the meantime, the Guild is preparing to move all their organizational items to a new location. We began our formal organization work in an office at the Hubbard House in 1980. Upon taking over stewardship of the Cooke-Dorn House in 1995, we relocated our base from the Hubbard House. Further cleanup is being accomplished to return the site to management by the Ohio History Connection.

OHG Financial Standing

Our financial standing remains strong for 2025. We continue to have a CD investment instrument with Civista Bank. It matures in May of this year and averages \$375 per month in earnings. We will be reviewing renewal options with a goal of continuing the trend of nice earnings. Our checking account is healthy as well with just under \$17.5 thousand in reserve. This will help us fund our recent DIY event, membership banquet, garden tour, tour of homes and other events to be planned for the remainder of 2025.

Cooke-Dorn House Transition Activities

With our transition away from the management of the Cooke-Dorn property, I have been working over the past few weeks on some related activities. A post office box has been secured to receive mailings. **Our new address is PO Box 523, Sandusky, OH 44870.** This is now reflected on our website. I have also been in contact with the Ohio History Connection to move the billing for utilities to their organization. This will be completed as we wind down our management of the property.
