





Preservation is Key to Sandusky's Future

Decades ago the Old House Guild and the City of Sandusky worked together to preserve the rich history of our architecture and artifacts. Under the leadership of Ellie Damm, numerous buildings were placed on the National Registry of Historical Places. And over the years the Guild has continued the work of preserving along with providing the community with annual tours of beautiful homes, preservation workshops, and numerous resources for homeowners to access in the restoration of their homes and businesses.

National Trust for Historic Preservation

The Trust is a privately funded nonprofit that has worked for over 75 years to save America's historic places. In an article written by Priya Chhaya and posted on the organization's website, they provide six essential reasons to save old places that fit perfectly well with the challenges of our city:

1. Save Old Places to Save the Planet

We have all witnessed the deterioration of buildings in our community, many a result of the tough economic times. The city has devoted resources to inspect properties, fund home improvements, and encourage property owners to keep their structures in good condition. But in many cases properties deteriorate to the point of no return, requiring the tear down and removal of material that ends up in dumps. This is not only wasteful, but destructive to our earth.

2. Save Old Places to Advance Social Justice

Preserving historic places in our city allows our residents to learn more about the struggles within our population during times of slavery, wars, depressions and social movements. These stories allow a community to learn from the past and improve conditions for all.

3. Save Old Places to Support Affordable Housing

Sandusky, like so many cities is facing a housing crisis. As properties are recycled, investors upgrade old structures and elevate rent to a level that many cannot afford. Saving old places can provide affordable housing if we can provide potential property owners the resources that will enable them to consider taking the leap of ownership. Tearing them down simply reduces the housing stock.

4. Save Old Places to Support Local Economic Development

The Trust has been involved in projects that redevelop main streets in deterioration. Improving central business districts are essential for economic development. Sandusky has made substantial improvements that are attracting new businesses in our downtown. Numerous buildings have been saved and redeveloped for new uses that have grown the local economy.

5. Save Old Places to Promote Cultural Preservation

When communities fail to save old places they experience the loss of the culture that went with it. Unless recorded, traditions and institutional knowledge get buried in the rubble of a tear down. But when there is a concerted effort to preserve the artifacts that tell stories it allows culture to pass along to future generations. A good example of this is Market Place where folks can tour the hallways and learn more about times gone by.

6. Save Old Places to Preserve History for Future Generations

Many of our members know that the Guild was instrumental in saving the historic Johnson House next to the library. The story of Leonard Johnson is important to Sandusky history because he owned the island that was leased to the U.S. government during the civil war to imprison confederate officers. Future generations will continue to know the connection through the preservation of his former home.

What you can do to help us preserve:

Be our eyes and ears in the community. If you see a historic structure or artifact in need of preservation, let us know! Sometimes these can go unnoticed by us, the city, or other

property owners. Call us or email us and we will take it from there.
